Foreclosure information from the Federal Reserve

I received the following from the Federal Reserve in Boston. It may be some help if you or someone you know has been going through foreclosure.

"The Federal Reserve and the Office of the Comptroller of the Currency have initiated enforcement actions against a group of mortgage servicers because of deficiencies in the servicers' foreclosure processes. The regulators are encouraging borrowers who were financially harmed in the mortgage foreclosure process in 2009 and 2010 to request an independent review. After the review, servicers may be required to provide compensation. You have until September 30, 2012, to submit your request. "On June 21st Charles Gray turned 80 years old and watched in disbelief as his Route 7 business Mahican Moccasin, in Pownal, VT was ravaged by flames and destroyed. I spoke with him and his wife and daughter a few days after the fire. His attitude is so positive as he returns to the site daily.

The building and contents loss and cost of cleanup far exceeds insurance coverage.

The race will begin at the stroke of midnight under the light of a (nearly) full moon at the Pownal Valley Fire Department's station on Route 7 at the top of the hill in Pownal, with the Ramble starting shortly thereafter. Race prizes go three deep across many age groups, and entrants in both events will be eligible to receive the "Most Visible in the Moonlight" award.

Willy performs in period dress and the event is a reenactment of how the Declaration was read community by community across the colonies that would soon become the United States.
